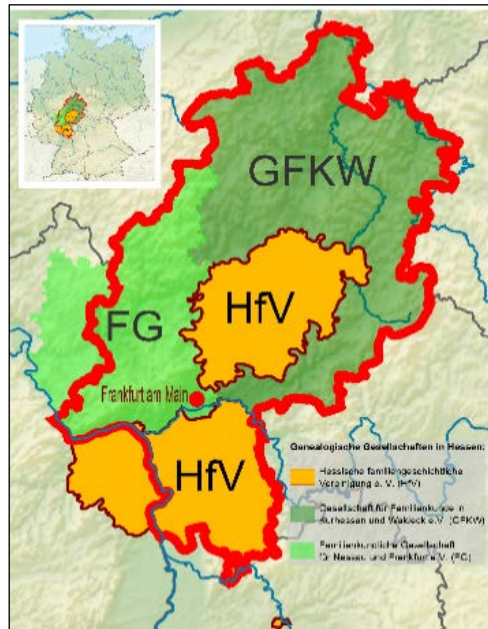

Our society set oneself to support the family research in the provinces **Oberhessen**, **Rheinhessen** and **Starkenburg** of the former Grand Duchy Hesse and the later People’s State of Hesse.



The groups in the districts and the regulars’ tables organize local events. The meetings will be announced on our website.

Civil registers were introduced in the German Empire in 1876. The older of these documents are collected centrally by the state of Hesse, scanned and gradually published on the Internet after the data protection periods have expired.

From 1808 on the parishes in **Oberhessen** and **Starkenburg** (today’s southern Hesse) had to hand over copies of their books to the government in Darmstadt.

With the French occupation of the left bank of the Rhine in the 1790s, civil registers began to be kept there. In **Rheinhessen** this continued until 1875.

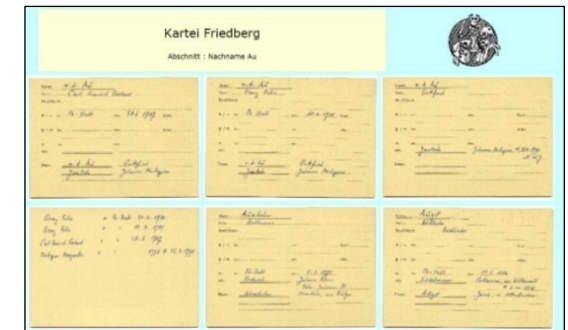


We scan the documents from the 19th century and post them in our **members’ area**. There are around 900,000 digital copies (=pages) available.

Members have started to transcribe book entries. So the data can be searched and easier used by other members.

In the course of time many researchers left their legacies to us.

Several **card files** with personal data were included. We have digitized and indexed more than 500 000 record cards. The stock is available in the member area.



The research recordings (95 000 pages) are published as **„Lose Ahnenlisten“** in the members area.

A **Ortsfamilienbuch (OFB)** is an evaluation of available sources of a community. It lists the elementary families and ascendants resp. descendants.

In our office we have a library of about 5 000 OFB, other **books** and also **newspapers**.

We started to describe all of them in GenWiki in order to facilitate searches by Google, Bing etc.

News are published on our homepage,
Facebook and Mastodon.

Every month we inform our members about
current topics with our **newsletter** by email.



We publish the magazine “**Hessische Genealogie**” quarterly together with two other Hessian associations.
